L'ORIENT: UNVEILING OF JUNE'S TREE and PLAQUE

As those of you on the Sunshine Coast will have noticed, the site of June's medical clinic and "Jalloonda", the old Queenslander on the Maroochy River behind her clinic now has a very different look. The new apartment building, called "L'Orient" has been completed and officially opened.

As part of the sale to local development company, Mosaic, their CEO, Brook Monahan made a generous donation to the Foundation and agreed to keep us in the loop about plans for the site.

The proceeds of the sale of June's Duporth Avenue properties are currently providing the funds for the final 7 years of the Foundation's giving. In appreciation of June's service to the Sunshine Coast, Brook said "I suspect it will be one of the buildings we are most proud of for a very long time. We will obviously do everything we can do to do justice to the special site the building sits upon".

In March, we were delighted to be invited to attend an opening ceremony including the unveiling of a plaque at the base of the feature tree at the entrance to *L'Orient* which was planted in honour of June's service to the Sunshine Coast community.

Knowing June would not be at all happy with just an everyday normal apartment building, we were happy to be part of the opening of a refined and distinctive building which absolutely suits its location.

INTRODUCING A CURIOUS TRACTOR – OUR NEWEST PARTNER

We are delighted to be supporting a start-up organisation called "A Curious Tractor".

In early 2023, a phone call from a guy called Nic who wanted to have a chat about a possible connection with the JCF signalled the start of a slow but steady move into a formal partnership. Nic had recently purchased a parcel of land in the Sunshine Coast Hinterland at Witta.

He had also fulfilled a childhood dream of owning a tractor. With his land and a tractor he was all set to do good things through a new social enterprise called "A Curious Tractor".

Nic has a good track record of growing small things into big things. Turns out he was not just any old Nic. He was actually Nic Marchesi OAM. Back in 2014 as aspirational 20-year-olds, he and his mate Lukas Patchett had thrown a couple of washing machines on the back of a ute to offer free laundry and conversations for people doing it tough. 10 years later, the now mighty Orange Sky Laundry (<u>www.orangesky.org.au</u>) is one of Australia's highest impact charities.

Nic is now in the exploratory stages of creating a different sort of impact. Many of his thoughts are aligned with what we think June would have liked to see happen in her neighbourhood, including the setting aside a part of the land to be named *June's Patch*. Amongst other things, *June's Patch* will be used for:

- Growing nutrient dense foods which will be provided to disadvantaged communities rather than their usual path to high class restaurants
- Offering a residential bush environment for respite and healing for overworked health professionals
- Offering a place of connection for medical researchers and medical practitioners
- Offering a place of learning about horticulture and hospitality for young people entangled in the



youth justice system.

The JCF Board were delighted to accept Nic's suggestion that we hold our October 2024 Board meeting on *June's Patch*. On Saturday, we conducted our meeting in the very finest indoor / outdoor meeting room. We then enjoyed pizzas coming out of the woodfired pizza oven before retiring to a variety of cabins and tents on Saturday night. On Sunday morning we venjoyed a challenging walk through the rainforest to the creek that runs through the property.

It's early days yet for Nic and his enterprise partner Ben Knight, but we are excited to be with them from the beginning. Having made a \$30,000 donation earlier this year, it was an easy decision for us to decide on a second grant of \$30,000 for them to use next year.





OUR REFRESHED WEBSITE

We urge you to have a look at our refreshed website June Canavan Foundation.

Back in 2015, Excite Media in Brisbane guided us through the process of establishing a contemporary website which has served us well. We were happy to re-engage with Excite Media for a "refresh" of the site which should now see us through the final 7 years of the life of the JCF.

The refreshed site has a brighter, cleaner look which is easier to navigate. It integrates our Impact Framework properly and makes it clearer for funding applicants to determine whether they are aligned with our focus areas, values and criteria.



REFINING OUR GOALS AND TARGETS

For the last couple of years, JCF Board members have been interested in refining our focus areas and using the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, commonly known as the SDGs, to guide a more focussed approach to our grant making. Since we began in 2011, we have been conscious that our grant making has been very broad ranging, and we wondered whether better defining our goals and targets would help us have more impact. In March this year, our Company Secretary, Jo Saies facilitated a workshop in which we considered all of these issues.

As a result, we now have a document which clearly sets out the specific areas of Sport, Education, Health and Conservation that we are interested in funding. Our work contributes to five SDGs:

CONGRATULATIONS TO EMILY BEECROFT

For the last 8 years we have provided two different types of June Canavan scholarships for students at the University of the Sunshine Coast (USC):

- Regional Scholarships for female students from the country
- Para-Sport Scholarships for students training for the Paralympics

Several of our Para-Sport scholarship holders over the years have gone on to represent Australia in World Championships and the Paralympic Games.

Last year, we were proud to support Emily Beecroft who won Gold and Bronze medals at the 2024 Paris Paralympics. Her gold medal was in the Mixed 4×100 m freestyle relay and she won her Bronze in the S9 Women's 100 m butterfly She also finished fourth in the S9 Women's 100 m freestyle S9.
